

## WISCONSIN FISHING SEASON UPDATES



The <u>2023-2024 Guide to Wisconsin's Fishing Regulations</u> is now available.

These regulations went into effect on April 1, making now the perfect time for anglers to review daily bag and size limits and season dates. Additionally, anglers are encouraged to review and understand any specific rules or regulations associated with the body of water they plan to fish. All license requirements apply.


All residents and non-residents over 16 must possess a 2023-2024 general fishing license to fish in Wisconsin. Annual resident licenses cost only \$20, with information on additional options available on the <u>Fishing Licenses webpage</u>. Fishing licenses can be purchased online via <u>GoWild</u>, at a registered <u>sales location</u> or at DNR Service Centers.

The general fishing and <u>trout fishing regulations</u> can be found online and at <u>locations where licenses are sold</u>.

#### WISCONSIN WILDFIRE INFORMATION

Spring is upon us, which is a good opportunity to remind anyone wanting to conduct a burn outdoors that this is the peak of Wisconsin's wildfire season. It's important to remember that right after the snow melts and before vegetation greening is the most critical time to take note of the rapidly changing fire conditions. Let <u>WisBURN</u> help! Visit <u>apps.dnr.wi.gov/wisburn</u> to monitor the fire danger and daily burn restrictions in *your* backyard.

WisBURN is a critical public communication tool used by the Division of Forestry to provide accurate and timely information on current fire danger, DNR burn restrictions and fire activity across Wisconsin.

## 2023 SPRING HEARING - ONLINE

The Spring Hearing questionnaire will go live on April 10, 2023 (starting at noon) and remain open through noon on April 13, 2023. https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/about/wcc/springhearing

The public will have the opportunity to provide input on the natural resources proposed rule changes from the DNR, and advisory questions from the Natural Resources Board (NRB) and WCC through the online input option.

You are all encouraged to participate in the Spring Hearings. If you plan to contribute your input to these questions, please take time to look over the questions in advance. If

you are unsure about the meaning of any of the questions, or want more information feel free to reach out to your WCC mentor for clarification. If you don't have an opinion on a question, or if you aren't really sure, you can just click "no opinion".

## 2023 WCC CONVENTION

Oshkosh, Thursday, May 11th through Saturday, May 13th.

This is the one time of year when WCC delegates from all 72 counties come together. The 2023 convention site is located at the Best Western Premier Waterfront Hotel on property adjacent to the Fox River and nearby Lake Winnebago.

All YCC delegates are invited to attend this convention. Specific YCC focused activities are being planned in addition to attending general Conservation Congress meetings. This convention will help you learn more about the work of the Conservation Congress, meet new YCC delegates, participate in field trips, fish on the Fox River outside of the hotel, learn about local fish research, sturgeon populations, and much more!

All meetings and events will take place at the hotel property or within a short drive.

Thursday - YCC activities will begin around 5:30pm (fishing, field trip, YCC delegate social)

Friday – all day (meetings, learn about Lake Winnebago, fish populations, sturgeon biology, trivia, YCC delegate social, fly tying and more.)

Saturday - the convention will conclude around noon.

## UPCOMING CDAC MEETINGS

Each county in Wisconsin has a County Deer Advisory Council (CDAC) to provide input and

recommendations to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources on deer management within their county. Consider joining a local CDAC meeting to learn about local deer management.

The DNR is currently encouraging the public to submit feedback for the upcoming deer season.

### LEARN TO HUNT BEAR APPLICATION

Beginning in 2005, the Wisconsin DNR began offering Learn to Hunt Bear opportunities. The Learn to Hunt Bear Program (LTHB) is an opportunity to expose novice hunters to the hunting experience and recruit new hunters into the sport. The Conservation Congress is one of the statewide conservation organizations that are specifically issued a bear harvest tag through the LTH Bear Program.

Each spring the Conservation Congress accepts applications from novice hunters interested in participating in the LTH Bear Program. Applicants must fill out and submit an application along with a brief essay describing why they would like to be considered to receive the bear harvest tag and why they would like the opportunity to hunt bear.

Applications must be postmarked by Wednesday, April 26, 2023.









## ELK MONITORING IN JACKSON COUNTY

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is looking for volunteers to help our Wildlife Management staff collar elk calves between May 19 and June 18. Each shift needs 15 or more volunteers so we can collar as many elk calves as possible for our multi-year study of Wisconsin's elk herd.

If you'd like to join the fun and you're OK with a little hard work in the outdoors, please consider signing up for your most convenient availability.

#### Why Collar Elk Calves?

Elk collaring is part of a multi-year study of Wisconsin's elk herd. We search for calves in late spring, right around the time they're born, to take measurements and fit them with a temporary GPS collar that will grow with the elk calf.

The elk calves collared by our staff and volunteers provide crucial data for understanding elk movement, breeding and survival.

#### Who Should Volunteer?

Elk calf searching is fun, but it's also hard work. Volunteers should be in good shape for crossing through thick brush and uneven terrain. It's important to wear weather appropriate outdoor clothing, sturdy boots, and a mosquito head net as bug spray is not allowed during calf searching.

#### Sign Up For The 2023 Elk Calf Search

WHEN: May 19 to June 18

WHERE: Meet-up locations may vary, but will most likely be in Black River Falls, WI. All searches will take place in the central elk range.

## VIRTUAL FISHING CONTEST

All YCC delegates are invited to join a summer fishing contest using the Fishdonkey app. There are various species, stringer and "any other fish" categories.

Any kind or size of fish, caught anywhere could be recognized. Even if you catch nothing at all, you can follow the leader boards to see how everyone is doing.

This contest runs from Saturday, May 6 through November 1st. You can join anytime throughout the contest.

Categories: Stringer of 5 for following species: (bass, bluegill/sunfish, crappie, inland trout, northern pike, perch, walleye/sauger) and wildcard (ANY other fish).

Please read all rules. All fish must be entered through the FishDonkey app. A photo of the fish (on a measuring board/tape) AND a photo of you holding the fish are required for the caught fish to be verified.




### YCC VIRTUAL GATHERING -Wednesday, April 12, 7:30-8:30pm

## YOUTH TURKEY HUNT - APRIL 15-16

Wisconsin's annual <u>Spring Turkey</u> <u>Youth Hunt</u> is designed to give young hunters the opportunity to hunt and gain valuable experience without competing against adults.

The youth hunt is open to resident and non-resident hunters under age 16 who possess a valid spring turkey license, stamp, and harvest authorization. Youth hunters must

be accompanied by an adult age 18 or older. All youth hunters must have successfully completed Hunter Education unless they are participating under the Mentored Hunting Program.

Youth hunters can use a harvest authorization for any time period, but they are limited to the turkey management zone for which their authorization was issued. <u>All other spring</u> turkey hunting regulations apply.

## ENROLL IN OUTDOOR SKILL CLASSES

A variety of safety classes are available for registration on the WI DNR website, <u>GoWild</u>.

The easiest way to view available courses is to use the drop down box to choose a course, and set the County as "statewide"

Current courses include:

- Boat, ATV, Snowmobile
- Hunter
- Advanced: Muzzleloader
- Archery
- Trapper

The DNR is also looking for individuals to become <u>safety instructors</u>. Individuals under age 18 can become a <u>Junior</u> <u>Volunteer Instructor</u>.
