YCC delegates participated in a virtual fishing contest from May 7 through November 1. The virtual platform was through the app: FishDonkey. The summer contest focused on catching multiple fish of the same species. Winners were selected based on the "stringers" they caught throughout the summer. Fish caught in any state or around the world were eligible.


Aside from your interest in the outdoors, are there other personal activities that you enjoy?





TREE FELLING COURSE AT UW-STEVENS POINT

Who can apply? High school junior and senior students.

When: March 22-24, 2024, Treehaven,

Tomahawk, Wisconsin

Application deadline: February 2



In this course, high schoolers will join UW-Stevens Point forestry undergraduate students and industry professionals in a 3-day, field-intensive chainsaw training. As part of this course, you will work directly with more than 10 industry professionals to gain the knowledge, skills, and experience needed to safely fell a tree.

Through guided field training you will learn how to safely cut down, delimb, and buck a tree while earning an industry-recognized certificate and college credit. Specifically, you will learn directional felling and chainsaw safety while earning 1 credit in FOR 396 from UWSP and Tree Felling certification from UWSP and Husqvarna.

All participants will receive a complimentary set of personal protective equipment, donated by Husqvarna, including chainsaw chaps, hard hat with hearing protection, and safety glasses. All costs are covered by program sponsors. (Please note that on-site lodging will not be available for high school participants).

BEAR DEN REPORTING

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources' Office of Applied Science is asking for your help this fall and winter to identify potentially active bear dens.



Den location data is being collected as part of the ongoing Black Bear Litter and Diet Survey, which seeks to estimate bear reproductive rates within management zones and monitor the effects that the consumption of human food might have on them. The information gathered will then be used to inform bear management decisions, including harvest quotas, throughout the state.

If you see a potentially active black bear den, you can report its location to the scientists leading this project using **this survey link**.

The public is encouraged to report as much information about occupied black bear dens as possible without approaching or disturbing the dens.

Please read all rules. All fish must be entered through the FishDonkey app. A photo of the fish (on a measuring board/tape) AND a photo of you holding the fish are required for the caught fish to be verified.
