Ari, YCC delegate from Jackson Co. caught rainbow trout during the fishing opener.




Caleb, YCC delegate from St. Croix Co. was successful with his turkey hunt. He also saw a black bear about 40 yards away.

All YCC delegates are invited to attend the YCC career day. We will be learning about special characteristics about the property, wildlife management objectives, current and past research, educational outreach, endangered species, recreation management, and all of the careers and support that are necessary to operate a state property like Sandhill.

We will take a wagon ride on the Trumpeter Trail, and stop at various points along the way. During this property tour, we will see the bison herd, learn about endangered Karner Blue Butterflies, discuss deer management, search for wildlife using radio telemetry, talk about

heavy equipment & habitat management, learn about hiking trail maintenance, and much more!

Sandhill Wildlife Management Area is managed by a team of Wisconsin DNR wildlife technicians, a wildlife biologist, a forester and the property supervisor. This unique property is surrounded by a 9' deer-proof fence, providing the perfect environment for wildlife research.

15 YCC delegates gathered in Oshkosh for the WCC Convention. In addition to joining WCC delegates for some of the meetings, the YCC participated in field trips and nightly socials.

Highlights included:

- Fishing on the Fox river. Some enjoyed early morning fishing and didn't mind the rain. Plenty of fish were caught and released, but a few (huge ones) got away!
- Learning about fish population surveys. The DNR staff at the Asylum Bay Fish Shop demonstrated electro fish shocking techniques and talked about population survey techniques on Lake Winnebago.
- Discussions on the social, economic, and ecological impacts on fish management.
- Jig-making, fly-tying, snack-eating, trivia-guessing, bucket-raffle-wishing, friendship-creating, lots of learning, and lots of fun!

LEARN TO HUNT DEER - SANDHILL

The Wisconsin DNR is accepting applications for the 2023 Learn to Hunt Deer program at <u>Sandhill Wildlife Area</u>.

The youth program is open to young hunters aged 12-15, and the adult program is for hunters age 16 and older with no previous experience hunting deer with a firearm. A mentor must accompany all hunters. Applications for both programs are due July 1, 2023. The registration fee is \$40.

Both programs will include workshops held on Aug. 23 and 25-26, and will end with a one-day hunt on Nov. 4, 2023 at Sandhill

Apply for the 2023 Sandhill Learn to Hunt program on the application webpage. The application deadline is July 1, 2023.

YCC SUMMER PROGRAM

All YCC delegates are invited to join a summer fishing contest using the Fishdonkey app.

Any kind or size of fish, caught anywhere could be recognized. Even if you catch nothing at all, you can follow the leader boards to see how everyone is doing.

This contest runs from Saturday, May 6 through November 1st. You can join anytime throughout the contest.

Categories: Stringer of 5 for following species: (bass, bluegill/sunfish, crappie, inland trout, northern pike, perch, walleye/sauger) and wildcard (ANY other fish).

Please read all rules. All fish must be entered through the FishDonkey app. A photo of the fish (on a measuring board/tape) AND a photo of you holding the fish are required for the caught fish to be verified.
