


# Early Citizen Involvement

In 1934, UW professor Aldo Leopold, Chief Warden Harley MacKenzie, and Superintendent of Game, William Grimmer designed the county based system of citizen involvement we know as the Wisconsin Conservation Congress.

The Wisconsin Conservation Congress is the only statutory body in the state where citizens elect delegates to advise the Natural Resources Board and the Department of Natural Resources on how to responsibly manage Wisconsin's natural resources for present and future generations.

***“Would you support the concept of establishing a Youth Conservation Congress?”***






The YCC is a hands-on program, involving youth in natural resource management, citizen-based science, and providing avenues to engage in policy making.




# YCC & High School Credit Options
