## DNR Seeking Public Comment For Environmental Review Of City Of Milwaukee Safe Drinking Water Loan Program Project

**MADISON, Wis. –** The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) today announced it is seeking public comment on the Safe Drinking Water Loan Program's environmental review determination of the City of Milwaukee project.

The project includes watermain replacements on West Casper Street, North 78<sup>th</sup> Street, West Acacia Street, East Linus Street, East Potter Avenue, East Falling Health Place, West Green Tree Road, North 90<sup>th</sup> Street, North 87<sup>th</sup> Street, North 75<sup>th</sup> Street, North 52<sup>nd</sup> Street, West Sheridan Avenue, North 100<sup>th</sup> Street, North 98<sup>th</sup> Street, West Olive Street, North Colgate Circle, North 83<sup>rd</sup> Street, West Fiebrantz Avenue, and North Dousman Street to improve its public drinking water system.

Activities related to this project are minor actions under chapter NR 150, Wis. Adm. Code, for which no environmental analysis is required; an environmental review must be conducted under 40 CFR 35.3580 before funding this project.

The City of Milwaukee submitted with its financial assistance application the information and materials required to conduct a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA)-like environmental review of the potential environmental impacts of the project and related activities.

The Safe Drinking Water Loan Program has determined that the project will not result in significant adverse environmental effects, and no further environmental review or analysis is needed before proceeding with funding the project.

Based on the comments received, the Safe Drinking Water Loan Program may prepare an environmental analysis before proceeding with the funding process. The analysis would summarize the DNR's consideration of the project's impacts and reasonable alternatives.
