The library has recently received a number of new books which have failed to capture the reader's eye. Among the newer books are the following. Beacon Lights of Literature by Randolph W. Chamberlain. The book is composed of eight large sections that should afford sufficient reading material for those desiring it. The sections deal with letter writing, English, Poetry from Chaucer to Milton, Drama, Speeches, Modern American and English Poetry, Magazines and newspapers, a Short Story of English and American Literature and Modern World Literature.

Uncle Sam's Attic by Mary Lee Davis. This book is a story of Alaska today. Mary Lee Davis relates the experience of natives in this cold country. She tells of the unexplored treasures yet to be found.

Miracle of Right Thought--by Orlish--Swett--Marlen. This book is one of the most interesting books on the shelf. It tells why to think and act right. The book teaches us the divinity of right desire; it tries to show that everybody ought to be happier than the happiest of us are now; that our lives were meant to be richer and more full than at present and that we shorten our lives considerably by false thinking.

Over African Jungles by Martin Johnson. This is the fourth and last book to be published by the late Martin Johnson and can be listed as his best accomplishment. It portrays adventure very vividly in the unexplored region of the Dark Continent. Through the aid of his wife and companion Oae Johnson, he has gathered together some very interesting reading material that should capture the hearts of the true lovers of adventure.

At the west end of the library the educational class rooms are under construction. There are three rooms. One large Assembly room, a dark-room for developing photographs and a typewriting room for the typing classes. With the completion of these new rooms, the enrollment of the classes in Typing, Photography, Forestry, etc., will increase considerably.
