Reason for this Proposal

The stream is unnamed (see reverse), and when referred to by local people it is sometimes called "the ditch." In this environmentally sensitive era I think "the ditch" as an informal name or "no name" is terrible. I have owned land in Section 21 and Section 28 T5N, R8E, Town of Montrose, since 1987, and the stream, or as I prefer to call it a creek, on our property is approximately one-half mile and very near its mouth, where the creek joins the Sugar River.

The creek is beautiful. This spring I saw many minnows in clear water.

This summer I learned there is a process for giving this creek a name.

Origin and Significance of Recommended Name

Corkscrew Creek is a great name for this creek. There are a number of corkscrew willow trees that are growing along the creek on our land, many of which I planted. The creek is 5.96 miles long along which there are more corkscrew willows. Naming the creek after a tree is an environmental friendly name and is appropriate for the Sugar River Basin, since I believe that the Sugar River was named after sugar maples, from the abundance of sugar maples near its mouth.
