#### **Rule Information**

This public hearing will cover two proposed rulemaking efforts updating ch. NR 809, Wis. Adm. Code:

- The objective of Board Order DG-01-24 is to establish drinking water standards, referred to as Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs), based on the new federal standards for certain per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) set individual MCLs for five of the PFAS, as well as a Hazard Index approach, to protect public health from mixtures of these substances. In establishing standards consistent with federal requirements, this rule would revise the state PFOA and PFOS MCLs to be consistent with (no less stringent than) the new federal MCL standards for PFOA and PFOS, as required under the federal Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA).
- The objectives of Board Order DG-02-24 are to:
  - Clarify and correct existing requirements to meet the requirements of the EPA and the SDWA.
  - Establish a definition, address redundancies and omissions, clarify to improve understanding and readability, and correct grammatical, spelling, and punctuation errors.
  - Update Consumer Confidence Report requirements to be consistent with new federal regulations under the SDWA.

#### **Initial Regulatory Flexibility Analysis**

For both of these rules, the state is not imposing additional costs above what is required in federal rules. If the federal changes were not promulgated in state administrative code, public water systems in Wisconsin would still be obligated to comply with these requirements under the federal Safe Drinking Water Act. There are no additional state costs of implementing and complying with the proposed state rule. The Economic Impact Analysis does provide an estimate of the costs of the federal rule requirements in Wisconsin.

Implementing the federal and state rules for drinking water standards for PFAS (DG-01-24) will affect small businesses. These rules provide some flexibility by allowing monitoring waivers to reduce the frequency of required monitoring at public water systems that are below half of the MCL trigger levels of PFAS.

Implementing the revised federal requirements in (DG-02-24) will have minimal impacts related to some water systems having to distribute additional consumer confidence reports.
