ORDER OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN NATURAL RESOURCES BOARD

AMENDING RULES

The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board proposes an order to **amend** NR 10.01 (1) (d), (e) 1. and 2., (h) 3., (k), (L) 2. a., and (m) 1.; relating to establishing the 2027-2030 migratory bird season framework and regulations.

Analysis Prepared by the Department of Natural Resources

1. Statute Interpreted:

In promulgating these rules, statutes being interpreted or establishing agency authority include s. 29.014, Stats.

2. Statutory Authority and Explanation of Agency Authority:

Chapter 29 of the Wisconsin Statutes addresses the department's authority with respect to wild animals and plants. Section 29.014, Stats., confers broad rule-making authority to the department to "establish and maintain open and closed seasons for fish and game and any bag limits, size limits, rest days and conditions governing the taking of fish and game that will conserve the fish and game supply and ensure the citizens of this state continued opportunities for good fishing, hunting and trapping. This grant of rule-making authority allows the department to promulgate rules related to migratory game bird hunting.

3. Related Statutes or Rules:

This rule is related to an emergency rule, DNR number WM-13-25-(E), that the department intends to have in effect in August 2026.

4. Plain Language Analysis:

The proposed rule addresses migratory game bird seasons and regulations for 2026. This rule is necessary to authorize migratory game bird hunting in a manner consistent with federal frameworks for the Mississippi Flyway.

SECTION 1 amends the preferred options for duck seasons should there be a 30-day or 45-day waterfowl season.

6. Summary of, and Comparison with, Existing or Proposed Federal Statutes and Regulations:

Since migratory bird species are managed under federal law, each region of the country is organized in a specific geographic flyway which represents distinct migratory game bird populations. Wisconsin, along with Minnesota, Michigan, Illinois, and Iowa, are members of the Mississippi Flyway. Each year the states included in the flyways meet to discuss regulations and guidelines offered to the flyways by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS). The USFWS regulations and guidelines apply to all states within the Flyway, and therefore the regulations in the adjoining states closely resemble the rules established in this rule order, and only differ slightly based on hunter desires, habitat, and population management goals. However, these variations fall within guidelines and sideboards established by the USFWS.

7. If Held, Summary of Comments Received During Preliminary Comment Period and at Public Hearing on the Statement of Scope:

The Department held a preliminary public hearing on the statement of scope on Monday November 3, 2025, at 2 p.m. virtually through Teams. No members of the public attended the hearing. The department received one written comment during the open public comment period. This individual felt that since there was an early teal season, there is no longer a need to open the northern duck zone early. They also felt that because there are a large amount of southern zone hunters coming north to the northern zone due to the fact the northern zone opens a week earlier than the southern zone and that this causes overcrowding during that week.

8. Comparison with Similar Rules in Adjacent States:

9. Summary of Factual Data and Analytical Methodologies Used and How Any Related Findings Support the Regulatory Approach Chosen:

This rule adjusts migratory game bird seasons and regulations for 2026 to be consistent with the federal framework for the Mississippi Flyway, current biological information and public input. In general, season frameworks for migratory birds in 2026 are identical to those implemented for 2023-2025. There are three exceptions.

This rule also adjusts the Mississippi River Canada Goose Zone season framework by

eliminating the early closure in December. This will result in having the Canada Goose Season open throughout early and mid-December prior to freeze up on the Mississippi River. In 2023, the decision was made to match the Mississippi River Goose Zone season framework to that of the South Zone Goose Season. After review and public feedback, it was determined that this alignment did not provide any increased opportunity on the Mississippi River and has been changed to reflect the public input.

Lastly, as part of this multi-year season framework setting process, the department requested public input on a 30 and 45-day duck season framework specific for each of the three duck zones (North, South, and Open Water). Wisconsin has had 60-day duck seasons every year since 1997, however, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service authorizes 30 and 45-day duck season frameworks if duck populations or habitat conditions fall below a certain threshold. As part of this rule package, the department asked hunters under a hypothetical scenario what would be the preferred season dates if Wisconsin were required to shorten the season from 60-days to 30 or 45-days. Based on the most recent public input, this rule alters the 30 and 45-day frameworks to reflect that preference.

10. Analysis and Supporting Documents Used to Determine the Effect on Small Business or in Preparation of an Economic Impact Report:

These rules, and the legislation which grants the department rule-making authority, do not have fiscal effects on the private sector or small businesses. No costs to the private sector or small businesses are associated with compliance to these rules.

11. Effect on Small Business (initial regulatory flexibility analysis):

These rules are applicable to individual sportspersons and impose no compliance or reporting requirements for small businesses, and no design or operational standards are contained in the rule. Because this rule does not add any regulatory requirements for small businesses, the proposed rules will not have an economic impact on a substantial number of small businesses under s. 227.24(3m), Stats.

SECTION 1. NR 10.01 (1) (d), (e) 1. and 2., (h) 3., (k), (L) 2. a., and (m) 1. are amended to read:

NR 10.01 (1) (L) 2. a. Canada Geese and its subspecies: 5 during the season established in par. (g), and 3 during the seasons established in par. (h), except the bag limit is 5 in the Southern and Mississippi River zones beginning on December 16th Zone beginning on the third Saturday in December until the close of the season.

(m) *Falconry special season.* Any person possessing a valid falconry permit and hunting license shall be restricted to the following migratory game bird seasons and bag limits:
