Wardens In Training

Recruit conservation wardens hired in 2021 have been busy completing our law enforcement academy, specialized training weeks and field training. They have had valuable field experiences, developed skills and helped each other grow into their new careers.

Specialized trainings help our new wardens develop skills related to recreational vehicle operation, boat operation, environmental investigations, media contacts and many other topics. We realize recruits do not arrive on day one with these skills, so this is why all new hires receive these trainings.

These specialized hands-on trainings include time for new wardens to practice in realistic environments. This is the new warden's opportunity to make mistakes, pick up new techniques, practice enforcement contacts and learn from mentors.

Our Training Bureau works hard to ensure recruit wardens receive comprehensive and relevant training to keep themselves safe and successfully serve the public. The



recruit warden training program lasts approximately one year, and recruits are paid as full-time staff during their training. Recruits with prior law enforcement experience may be eligible to participate in an accelerated training program. Learn more on our <u>recruiting website</u>.

Community Service Officers



Our new Community Service Officer (CSO) program kicked off in late May. Newly hired CSOs completed two weeks of training with conservation warden staff, helping prepare community service officers for the variety of work they'll be doing all statewide this summer.



CSO positions are not law enforcement positions, but they work closely with our conservation warden staff on projects, public compliance, education and outreach. This is a paid summer position that can qualify as a college internship. We expect to announce our 2023 CSO hiring process in late 2022.
